Access to technology remains a critical concern. Research by Chen et al. (2020) highlights disparities in device availability and internet reliability among students of different socioeconomic backgrounds. Addressing these gaps is seen as essential for equitable learning outcomes (Ramirez, 2023).

## Theme 3: Instructor Readiness

The effectiveness of online learning is also influenced by instructor preparedness and digital literacy. Bailey and Singh (2021) suggest ongoing professional development programs improve instructors' confidence and pedagogical approaches in virtual settings.

## Theme 4: Learning Outcomes

There is mixed evidence regarding learning outcomes in online settings compared to traditional formats. While some meta-analyses (e.g., Lee & Watson, 2020) report no significant difference, others suggest discipline-specific disparities exist (Kim, 2022).

## Synthesis and Research Gaps

Existing literature converges on the importance of engagement, access, and instructor readiness but highlights the need for longitudinal studies to better assess long-term outcomes and examine differences across disciplines.

## Conclusion

Thematic organization has enabled identification of recurring topics in the literature. Future work should address unresolved issues, especially those related to access and instructor support.
